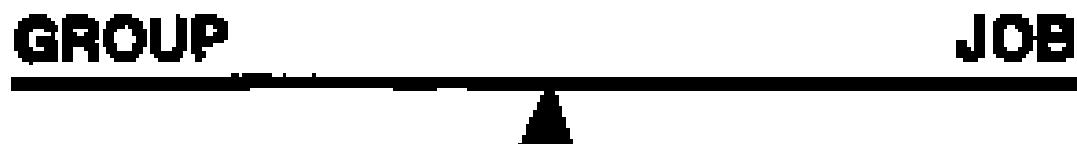

Keeping a Balance



Working Together

- ◆ Working together creates an awareness of each other
- ◆ As we work together to get a job done, we realize that we need each other to do a good job
- ◆ Awareness helps bring us together

Working Together

- ◆ Working together helps us get the job done
- ◆ It also strengthens the group; it helps us keep the group together

Underway Evaluating

- ◆ Are we getting the job done?
- ◆ Are we doing it right?
- ◆ Are we on schedule?
- ◆ Is everyone involved?
- ◆ Is everyone working well together, is everyone satisfied with the group's efforts?
- ◆ Does everyone want to keep going?

Evaluating and Effective Teaching

We evaluate needs by asking:

- ◆ What do I teach that will meet his needs?
- ◆ How much time will it take?
- ◆ How do I do it right?

Evaluating and Effective Teaching

We evaluate characteristics by asking:

- ◆ How can I get him involved in his own learning—what discovery is needed? (get him to help)
- ◆ How can I make the learning enjoyable? (encourage him to be pleased with the effort)
- ◆ How can I cause him to want to learn more? (make him eager for the next job)

Evaluating in a Patrol and Troop

- ◆ During and at the end of an activity or program
- ◆ As a regular feature of the patrol leaders' council meeting
- ◆ Before planning (evaluate past experiences)

Summary

- ◆ Evaluating helps the group see what they can do better the next time
- ◆ Evaluation can be used to help identify a problem, the patrol members can plan how to solve the problem.
